1. Maple Producers –

The Local Algonquin Association Information day was held at Deerhurst on January 16th with 75 people in attendance.

The First Tapping will be held on Saturday, March 14th at Matthew's Sugar Bush.

Maple Week will be the first weekend in April (4th-5th) with open houses at both Matthews and Sugarstone sugar bushes. More information can be found on ontariomaple.com

2. New Business –

a) Nomination of Chair/Co-Chair –

Leo Patey agreed to be the Chair again this year. We did not opt to vote for a Co-Chair.

b) Draft Budget –

The draft budget was presented – we appear to be on track at this time. Once additional vendor application and sponsorship revenues are received we should be in a positive financial position.

c) Sponsorship Coordinator / Volunteers to distribute letters –

Leo Patey volunteered to deliver sponsorship letters again. Other committee member volunteers are needed. Members to advise Kim if there is a group/business that we should include in our mail out / drop off.

d) Kidz Zone Programming –

This year we have Sarah Argue and the Rock the Arts Puppets and the Reptile Camp in our Kidz Zone.

e) Offsite Parking Coordinator –

We will need to find additional volunteers and especially someone to coordinate the offsite parking lot on Evan Hughe's property on Highway 534. Kim to discuss with Diane Cole and advertise on Facebook for Volunteers.

f) Pro Sports Business –

i) Tourism Component / History Component –

We will be following through with our Tourism component to the festival by reaching out to communities and groups to encourage them to participate and promote their own festivals / activities, etc. This component of the festival will be held in the gym and will consist of static displays and information.

j) North Bay Tourism –

North Bay Tourism is potentially interested in partnering with us to promote the festival and encourage tourism in our area. The proposed plan consists of having a shuttle take people to a couple of our producer's sugar bushes the week before the festival, then back to 250 Clark for maple apps and to North Bay potentially for an overnight stay. Kim to update the committee at our next meeting on this.

k) The Nipissing Reader – Ad –

The committee is not interested in doing a print ad in this publication. We currently only put '1' print ad in the North Bay Nugget early in April.

Other discussions:

We should consider hiring some security to assist especially inside the Sportsplex.

We will ask the paid duty OPP officers to be on foot and walk around the festival grounds this year.

We need to provide Mike Odrowski with a thank you card and small token of our appreciation for all of his assistance at the festival through the years.

Elite Chainsaw Art (Dan Labrecque) has agreed to participate this year. I will reach out and see whether there is any option for him to provide a small (maple leaf?) carving that we could provide as a prize in exchange for demographic info.

Leo will reach out to Ms. Hughes about use of the laundromat again this year for our musical entertainment /stage area.

The Powassan Lions and St. Mary's Church are not doing pancake breakfasts this year. We are hoping another group can step up and provide a breakfast at the Curling club.

We will need to use '2' of the Powassan Agricultural tents – one 20x40 for the audience area and one 20-30 for the stage. It is assumed one will be provided free of charge and we will rent the other one – Monika to confirm.

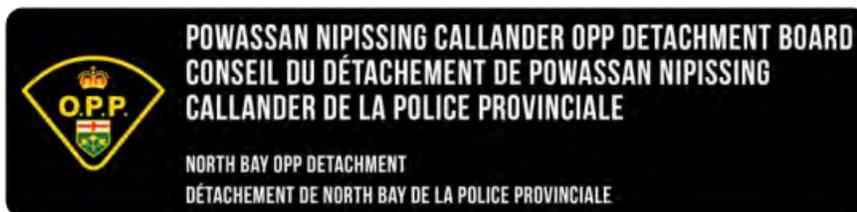
Leo and our new mascot will be visiting the 3 local elementary schools (providing candy and coloring pages/info) at some point and the producers on Maple weekend.

Briefing Note

Re: Rural Ontario Development (ROD) Funding – Trout Creek Community Centre Structural Repairs

Date: February 17th, 2026

Purpose: To provide Council with an update on staff's review of the Rural Ontario Development (ROD) Program eligibility for structural repairs at the Trout Creek Community Centre (TCCC).

Background: At the previous Council meeting, staff were directed through resolution to review the eligibility of the proposed structural column repairs at the TCCC under the Rural Ontario Development (ROD) Program. Staff participated in the ROD program webinar and subsequently attended a one-on-one coaching session with the funder to review the proposed scope of work and confirm eligibility requirements.

Analysis: Following the one-on-one discussion, written confirmation was received from the Ministry of Rural Affairs indicating that the proposed structural column replacements are considered major capital works and are therefore ineligible under the ROD Program. As the program does not fund major capital projects, the structural repairs work cannot proceed under the current ROD intake.

Next Steps: Staff will continue to monitor and pursue alternative funding opportunities, including provincial and community infrastructure grant programs, to support the required structural repairs at the TCCC. Any viable funding options will be brought forward to Council for consideration.

Recommendation: That Council receive this briefing note for information.

The Operations team has continued delivering winter services, facility maintenance, infrastructure repairs, regulatory compliance, and capital planning initiatives across the municipality.

Water / Wastewater

- Resolved chlorine pumping communication issue with OCWA.
- Exposed valves and completed clamp repair on King Street cast iron watermain.
- Repaired multiple residential curbstops including Home Hardware.
- Continued review of water meter processes and updated connection policy.
- Public Works yard well scheduled for drilling February 18, 2026.

Roads & Public Works

- Ongoing winter control and plowing operations.
- Snow bank removal in Powassan and Trout Creek to address blind spots and improve safety.
- Cold patching completed as weather permitted.
- Repaired damaged and misaligned signage.
- Completed streetlight repairs with additional repairs pending.
- Implemented monthly streetlight inspections.
- Continued preventative and emergency fleet maintenance.
- Working with Foreman on Pothole Repair Program planning.
- Regular toolbox meetings and safety planning.
- Tracking winter maintenance expenditures.

Trout Creek Community Centre (TCCC)

- Sewage backup cleared and system restored.
- New Zamboni board brush installed.
- Steady ice bookings and utilization.
- TSSA compressor inspection completed.
- Rooms and lifecycle components identified for long-term capital planning.

Powassan Sportsplex

- Received first Approval Notice from MECP for the CLI – ECA covering storm water and sanitary sewer systems. Streamline linear infrastructure upgrades which typically have a long ministry review timeline.

Closing Remarks

Operations continues to focus on preventative maintenance, regulatory compliance, financial oversight, and long term infrastructure sustainability while maintaining reliable day to day municipal service delivery.

Re: Parking Complaints and Issue Areas

RECOMMENDATION:

That this report regarding parking complaints and main issue areas be received; and further that the updated draft Parking Bylaw be brought back to Council for further review.

ANALYSIS:

During my time here thus far, I have only received a couple of parking complaints. One regarding vehicles parking across the driveway near the laundromat on Main Street, blocking access or exit for the people living there. The other regarding a trailer that was left at the end of Main Street in Trout Creek, blocking the turn around for the snowplough. Neither of these concerns required the issuing of tickets.

I have reviewed what records of parking complaints I could find from recent years and have determined that the most frequent complaints are made regarding the parking of vehicles around the arena during hockey games/events, and parking on Main Street, particularly near driveways and designated handicap accessible spaces. Some complaints have been received regarding the handicap accessible spaces on Main St.

An additional concern is people parking along the route to the fire hall during busy events at 250 Clark. Most often complaints such as these are easily addressed by speaking with the vehicle operator or at most issuing a warning. The purpose for the updates to the parking bylaw is to bring the document up to date and encourage continued compliance. Updating the language in the bylaw as well as the fines schedule makes our Parking Bylaw comparable to other parking regulations and assists with addressing our most common complaints.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this report regarding a Public Health, Safety, and Nuisance Bylaw be received.

ANALYSIS:

Following an unusual complaint regarding the burning of garbage indoors, a gap in our bylaws was identified. Research and consultation with other bylaw professionals pointed me to a section of the Municipal Act titled “Health, Safety and Nuisance” that contained multiple clauses which could close these gaps. Under the broad category of “Public Health, Safety and Nuisances” I am proposing a bylaw that would address newer issues such as inappropriate use of heating and cooking appliances, as well as update and replace previous bylaws regarding issues such as smoking, noise, clean yards, pits and quarries, discharge of firearms, and wrecking yards. Of the current bylaws we have, some of these date back as far as 2001 and require modern updates. The purpose of adding these new regulations and updating old ones is not to increase enforcement and issue more fines, but to bring our regulations up to date with current practices as well as provide us with proper enforcement guidelines when complaints are brought forth.
