Assessing Ontario's farmland properties

In 2016, MPAC will update the assessed values of every property in Ontario. All properties will have a legislated valuation date of January 1, 2016. Property Assessment Notices for farmland properties will be mailed in fall 2016.



We undertake extensive analysis to determine farmland values and use only sales of lands and buildings to farmers used for farm purposes. Sales to non-farmers are not used.



Our assessors are trained experts in the field of valuation and apply appraisal industry standards and best practices.



We review other information gained through property inspections and reviews, as well as land title documents, building

permits and sales questionnaires.

We also look at these factors:

- The value of the farmland, determined from sales of farmland in the area.
- The value of the residence and whether the farm residence is occupied by the person farming the property.
- The value of any farm outbuildings.
- The value of any other buildings not used in the farm operation.

Your municipality is responsible for setting tax rates. Farmland is taxed at up to 25% of the residential rate for municipal and education taxes. For information regarding eligibility for the Farm Property Tax Rate Program visit ontario.ca/farmtax.
